Television Review

The Old Man





In the first episode of The Old Man, Dan Chase is shown getting up three times during the night to use the bathroom. As an old man myself, I can relate. The series stars Jeff Bridges as Dan Chase a rogue CIA operative living off the grid until a hired assassin knocks on his door. Knowing that several people are after him, including the FBI's Harold Harper

(played by John Lithgow), Chase's only choice is to face his past. The dogs, in The Old Man, are devoted to Chase and play an important role in the plot, as well as being involved in some action scenes.

Dan confronts three CIA operatives sent to catch him in the first episode. Dan's dogs assist him in the struggle, and one of the operatives is killed by one of the dogs. The dogs are extremely welltrained and follow Dan's directions. With a whistle, Dan can summon them to his aid. Dan's dogs are usually with him wherever he goes, including cafes and road trips. As a result, the dogs can be considered fully-fledged characters. They are also given human-sounding names, Dave and Carol. In the series, two real Rottweiler dogs play the characters of Dave and Carol. Freya and Cain are their names. Bridges said he had a great time working with the dogs and had formed a deep bond with them.

As actors, the dogs have demanding jobs and I was happy to see that they used real dog actors, rather than computer generated images. Freya and Cain escorted Bridges to the premiere of the series at the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures in Los Angeles. Before filming began, the veteran actor spent a few days with the dogs, building a bond with Freya and Cain. Bridges also stated that among the two dogs, Freya was his favorite. What I like about The Old Man is that the dogs are portrayed as supporting characters rather than props in the story.

At the last Delegates meeting, the Club Development department made a presentation.

• They mentioned if a club has a new show chair to please send them the name and contact information by email.

• They asked clubs to consider having Canine Extravaganzas. This concept is when several sporting events are offered by a club at the same event. For example, at an Agility event clubs could also offer a Novice Only trial or Scent Work. Another example would be to offer FAST CAT at an Obedience/Rally event. The entire membership could be engaged because many sports are presented.

• The Club Relations Department sends out emails promoting monthly events to potential members.

• The concept of Meet and Greets events was discussed as a way of clubs increasing membership. They work with clubs to find new dog owners and potential members.

 \cdot $\,$ They encourage clubs to use Social Media and recommend clubs have a social presence.

There will be a very controversial vote at our next meeting. It is the vote to amend Article VII, Section 1 of the Charter and Bylaws of the AKC which removes the two consecutive term limit for AKC Board members. Email me and let me know if you are in favor of eliminating term limits for the AKC Board. As you may recall, this has been brought up and defeated on two occasions in the past and thus term limits have stayed. Under the current amendment, Board members after being on the Board two years must take one year off before running for the position again.
