## A Historic Win: Vito the Pug takes Top Dog


Move over, football! Thanksgiving Day brings a much more exciting sports-viewing experience with it - the National Dog Show. Each year in November, the Philadelphia Kennel Club hosts the National Dog Show, where the top conformation dogs from 205 breeds compete for the coveted title of Best in Show.

This year was a big one, every single one of the seven group winners would have been the first in their breed to win Best in Show. The herding group was represented by Rupert the <u>Berger Picard</u>. A dog with a name somehow more unique than its appearance, The Zit, an <u>Ibizan Hound</u>, won the Hound Group. The Non-Sporting group sent forth one of their tiniest members, JJ the <u>Lhasa Apso</u>. The Sporting Group winner was Houston the <u>Clumber Spaniel</u> - a rarer breed, but shout out to some of our very own club clumbers Percy, Winston, and Charlie! Monty the <u>Giant Schnauzer</u> showed off for the Sporting Group. The Reserve Best in Show was an adorable <u>Welsh Terrier</u> named Verde. And coming out on top of the Toy Group claiming the first ever Best in Show win for the <u>Pug</u> was Vito!


Vito is a two year old 18-pound pug from North Carolina. Pugs are described by the AKC as charming, loving, and mischievous - three great qualities to have in a dog. These pint sized pups are well-loved

by many and are known for being a sturdy option for those looking for a smaller dog. The breed standard weight is between 13-18 pounds, making the pug a portable option for those looking for a travel companion. To win Best in Show, Vito beat over 1900 dogs! Conformation is a highly competitive dog sport, with seasoned handlers, dedicated breeders, and meticulous owners. As family and friends travel to our homes for the holiday season, we are often reminded of something: not everyone makes a great houseguest! While it isn't easy to train your chatty uncle to behave in the house, it can be much easier to train your pup.

Preparation is key when it comes to keeping the holidays cheerful for our canine companions. The first step is to take a moment and think about your dog's personality and temperament. Is your dog a social butterfly who has never known a stranger and enjoys all interactions? Or maybe you have a wallflower who prefers to observe from a distance as they decide if a person is friend or foe? Perhaps somewhere in between? It is important to consider what your dog can handle and what expectations are fair for them, don't force

interactions if your dog's motto is "no new friends".

he was super — making up for my bad ankle (which flared up and made me unable to run or even walk for more than a month!).


Nikko says special thanks to Auntie Shannon for stepping in to run him when I was completely lame!


