

Finding Healing Through St. Serious: A Journey of Discovery and Growth

2023 was a year of profound discovery for me. At times, I wonder if I experienced a mid-life awakening—a jolt that set me on a year-long transformative path. It began in January, when I left Maryland to take a new job in Georgia. I made that move because for years, I believed that I could live anywhere and I had, but after just seven months, that hypothesis proved false in Georgia.

I returned to Maryland with emotional scars and a physical challenge: surgery to remove a non-cancerous tumor. The procedure went smoothly, but during recovery, I found myself adrift. My days became monotonous. Wake up. Wash up—sometimes. Work. Eat—sometimes. Watch TV or read. Sleep. Repeat. Even weekends followed the same uninspired pattern. As an introvert and a bit of a

loner, I was stuck in my bubble, disconnected from the world.

Then came the dream.

One day, while napping and nursing my surgical wounds, I dreamed of a Doberman. He exuded strength, love, stability, and a healing energy that felt almost divine. He placed his paw on my bed, looked at me with an intense, knowing gaze, and, in that moment, I felt something shift. A deep, unexplainable knowing told me I could heal —if I was willing to commit. But what was I healing from?

From that day forward, I became obsessed. I threw myself into learning everything I could about dogs, especially Dobermans. I studied their temperaments, pedigrees, breed standards, and the subtle differences between American and European lines. I connected with breeders, asked questions, and learned how to identify scams and unsuitable matches. For six months, I searched tirelessly for the right dog, sometimes feeling like it was an impossible quest.

Then, one day, I found a promising litter. The breeder checked all the boxes: champion pedigrees, longevity, no signs of genetic heart conditions, and the perfect temperament for service work. But there was one hitch—the puppy was in Georgia.

I hesitated, reluctant to revisit a place that had been so challenging. But I reminded myself: *Let this be one of the few positives to come out of my time there.*

The story of this puppy's beginnings was bittersweet. A man had bred his companion Doberman with another, only to find himself overwhelmed by a winter litter born in less- than-ideal conditions. Fortunately, the breeder, Kettlecove Dobermans, intervened, rescuing the pups and nursing them back to health.

When I arrived on March 11th, the day before my birthday, one pup stood out. As the others tumbled and played, he sat quietly, observing me with an intensity that felt almost human. When I approached, he came over and sat calmly. "Geesh, you're so serious," I said. And just like that, it was love at first sight.

We've been inseparable ever since.

As we approach St. Serious' first birthday, I'm filled with gratitude. He's more than just a dog—he's my partner in healing. Together, we've taken doggie swim lessons and countless training classes, and we practice so often that my neighbors think I'm a dog trainer. Most importantly, he's helped me reconnect with life.

I am outside again.

While my healing journey continues, St. Serious has been my anchor. As my service dog in training, he pushes me to leave my comfort zone and embrace the world. His velcro-like devotion and healing energy remind me daily that I am not alone and that it's okay to just be me. He also allows me to be silent, offering a comforting presence that feels like an invisible connection—a bond that speaks volumes without a single word.

God knew exactly what I needed. And with St. Serious by my side, I'm learning more each day about what I'm truly healing from. I am so happy that I found St. Serious.

Luna's (OTCH Wescot's Enchanted Princess UDX2 OM3 BN RE CGCU TKI) 2024 Obedience Achievements:

Luna began competing in the Utility B and Open B classes in January of 2024. She earned her Obedience Master (OM) title on March 17 and her Utility Dog Excellent (UDX) title on March 31. On May 26 Luna earned her OM2. This was followed on August 4 by winning her Obedience Trial Championship (OTCH) and then an OM3 on November 30.

Over the course of the year, Luna took 1st place in Utility B on 7 occasions, along with four 2nd place finishes, four 3rd places and two 4th places. In Open B, Luna finished: once in 1st place, five times in 2nd place, twice in 3rd place and six times in 4th. In addition, she won High in Trial on two occasions, as well as two High Combined awards.

Delegate's Corner

In the Companion Events Committee Meeting:

- Board member Steve Hamblin reported on the Board's position currently on the video of the tripod dog in agility. A discussion occurred on the committee's position and backed research on dogs participating in jumping activities. AKC VP of Public Relations and Communications Brandi Hunter reported that the safety and well being of all breeds of dogs from smallest to the largest breeds must be considered. Doug Ljungren reported on the pilot program which ends on July 1, 2025. The Committee has voted to leave the decision of these dogs participating in non-jumping exercises in Obedience and Rally classes permanently up to the AKC Board.
- The CEC reviewed the subcommittee report on reviewing Beginner Novice and Novice class exercises. In Beginner Novice the suggestion to change the Sit Stay-Handler Walk Around the Ring to have the handler walk a T pattern instead of walk around the ring. In Novice Class- committee is still working on recommendations and the rest of the CEC made comments.
- Diane Bauman exhibitor and instructor submitted her recommendations to the CEC on Saving the Sport of Obedience Competition and Can Obedience Learn from Agility? I found her suggestions very thought provoking. She is an author and I believe have written articles on the topic. If you cannot find these articles, I may be able to share. Let me know.
- Doug reported on the status of the Sport- Number of Entries to date from 2023 to 2024:
 - Conformation- (3.6%)
 - Agility- 2%
 - Fast Cat- 15%
 - Scent Work- 14%
 - Rally- 11%
 - Field Trials- (4%)
 - Obedience- 1%
 - AKC Temperament Test- 45%
 - Coursing Ability Test- 12%
 - Tracking- (0.2%)
- RACH in Orlando had an entry of 140. Obedience Classic had an entry of 266 teams.
- Rally and Obedience Nationals will be held July 3-7, 2025 and will be held at Purina Farms. Due to the smaller facility, the RNC will be held over the course of three days July 3-5 and the NOC will be held July 6-7.
- All judges have until Jan. 1 2025 to complete the Darkness to Light Class. If the individual did not take it, judging privileges will be blocked for future assignments. In Agility 77% have taken the class; in Obedience 75%, in Rally 76% and in Tracking 67%.
- DQ by Event Committee- 3 strikes- The AKC has approved a

- recommendation to establish a process where a dog that an event committee determines has attacked a person or dog on three occasions, even without injury, shall administratively be disqualified by AKC. It will apply to all AKC Sports.
- Agility- Change to Tire Jump- A displaceable connecting strap that holds the tire to the frame will be effective July 1, 2025. CEC agreed and supports the decision.
- Douglas Hurley, AKC Director of Agility reported the 2025 Agility Nationals will be March 13-16, 2025 in Tulsa. The event will be filmed on ESPN.

Active membership in the Capital Dog Training Club (CDTC) is available to an individual who:


- has completed no less than three (3) months as a training member paying the prescribed fees/dues, and
