When sitting down to write this article we thought about how we met Suzanne. And we couldn't remember exactly. We knew that it was at Capital, but was she our instructor? Someone friendly in the lobby? A fellow student? It surprised us that we couldn't remember. We realized that you don't know how special someone is going to become when you first meet them. And Suzanne was special.

As we reflect on our relationship with Suzanne, we realize that her

influence really shaped a significant part of who we have become. As it turned out, Suzanne was Training Director at Capital when we first met her. And her Golden Retriever, Tioga, was one and a half years old. Suzanne taught many classes at Capital. Basic being her favorite class, she felt it was where good training was the most necessary. She loved teaching new dog owners how to create a bond with their dog so they could have polite dogs. She taught dog owners of all ages, worked with all breeds, and met with teams privately. One famous client had a Portuguese Water Dog puppy during their eight years in Washington, DC. Suzanne never boasted about knowing or working with this power couple. Yet she loved working with them, their children, and their dog, just like she loved working with everyone.

She served Capital as President. She believed in dog training as such an important mission, that she devoted quite a bit of her time and energy in helping others become good trainers, too. She was a huge champion of the Golden Retriever breed. Serving on the boards of Potomac Valley Golden Retriever Club and the Golden Retriever Club of America in many positions and spanning many years. She was Show Chair for the Golden National in 2017, a huge project! She showed her dogs in conformation, taught them the skills needed for Obedience, and trained them to work in the field earning ribbons and titles in all these areas.

She encouraged others to do the same. That's how we became such great friends. We took Obedience classes together, trained together and went to trials together. She tried for several years to get us to try Hunt training. We were slow to jump on that (ducks in your freezer, no way!). But she convinced us to go to a hunt test and see how cool it is to watch the dogs do the work they were bred to do. And she was right! How beautiful to see the goldens running through the field to retrieve a bird. We now have a freezer for our training birds!

Ken with Bruno and Suzanne with Tioga trained together a lot in obedience. Using the dogs to motivate each other to do their best. Tioga was showing some hesitation with the broad jump. Suzanne knew that Tioga and Bruno were fiercely competitive, so she had the idea of setting up both dogs in front of the broad jump, and had Ken call them both over. Tioga flew over that jump as if his hind end were lit on fire! Along with Betsy and Rudi, we all spent many wonderful afternoons working in the field training in a variety of places. We would meet at a baseball field in Rock Creek Park adjacent a popular jogging trail. With our non-working dogs attached to the backstop fence, one of our dogs would retrieve frozen ducks we pitched. We'd have a great time setting up geometries, and blowing our duck calls and tooting on our whistles. Tioga, Bruno, Rudi, all would get their turn.

Suzanne was always willing to arrange a training date, and was so helpful with her experience, equipment, and enthusiasm. Those training sessions led to a growing friendship beyond dog training. She introduced us to the "Crawfish Boil", good vegetarian food, and great white wine. She loved her seafood, and we really took grilled oysters to the next level! Together we watched the Marvel Cinematic Universe movies, Dr. Who, and Game of Thrones. We shared new show ideas from Frankie Drake, to Murdoch Mysteries, to Miss Fisher. We sat in our backyard throwing bumpers and balls for the dogs, talking about our gardens. We sat in her backyards throwing bumpers and balls for the dogs, talking about her gardens.

Suzanne studied ancient Greek history. Her knowledge helped us understand the storied relationships among the constellations we watched together in the night sky.

Bruno and Tioga were the best of friends. When we would get together, Suzanne always made sure there were some Frosty Paws at hand, so Bruno and Ti could enjoy together. They chased a million balls together. There were many doggie sleepovers. Bruno would carry his backpack full of his overnight gear - his sucky toy, a frisbee, some treats. Tioga figured out how to open it up and help himself to the weekend's goodies. Smart boy. When Suzanne would have an appointment for medical treatments, she would drop Tybee (Tioga's son) by our backyard at 10am enroute to her doctor, then spend a visit with us at 1pm where we would share a nice lunch on the patio. The dogs would have a thrilling time chasing bumpers and each other, biting faces. We would have a wonderful time sharing stories, debating news of the day, debugging training foibles and celebrating performance successes. We treasured those visits, even looked forward to Suzanne's appointments. All in the rear view, now, unfortunately.

What one views as lovely can be fleeting. We take comfort that she is happily throwing balls for her dogs that have already gone over the Rainbow Bridge. We know that she'll always have enough balls for those dogs and the dogs that will be coming to play with her in the future. And we will take the lessons she passed to us, into show, trial, test, and life.



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Obichaffs Head to New York

You may have noticed that the club lobby entrance area is getting a clean up. But what, may you ask, has happened to the contents of the credenzas lining the wall now that the credenzas are gone? The contents of the library is being deaccessioned, so the seven boxes of books, and a few videos, will be made available to members at the upcoming yard sale (date to be determined). The Obichaffs? Well that's another story!

In March, Donna Cleverdon and a friend were in NYC to attend the opera

and decided to visit the AKC Museum of the Dog. Little did Donna realize that a casual inquiry with a museum staffer would lead to such a positive result for both our club and the AKC.

Formed in 1938, the Capital Dog Training Club of Washington, DC, began publishing a newsletter in 1945, held its first Obedience Trial in 1946, incorporated in 1947 and became an AKC member club in 1949. As Donna says: "The Obichaff is truly an historical document because we were there at the dawn of obedience competition in this country."

Donna returned home with the contact information for the Museum archivist, gave the information to me for follow up, I called, and the rest, as they say, is history. Though quite selective in what they will take, the Museum is interested in expanding its collection of materials that relate to companion dog sports. Given our club's history, they are pleased to accept paper copies of some of our older Obichaffs and are also taking scanned copies of what we can provide for their digital library.

This is an ongoing project, and current Obichaff Editor, Payton Murphy, is organizing a box of some older Obichaffs and is working to scan copies of the newsletters that had not previously been scanned by member Abigail Carter some years ago. One box of paper Obichaffs, from the lobby clean up, that were organized in binders and in good condition dating from 1972-1979 has already been sent to the Museum.

While accepting copies of the Obichaffs is an acknowledgement by the AKC of the value of companion dog sports as part of its history, this would not have been possible without our club's commitment to training, trialing and disseminating knowledge regarding dog training through publishing the Obichaff.

So thank you to all our Obichaff Editors past and present, to those members who have written articles that have expanded our knowledge and to all who have worked tirelessly to continue the club's strong presence in AKC dog sports. A special shout out to Joyce Dandridge, our wonderful representative to the AKC, and a special thank you to Donna Cleverdon for making the initial contact that got the ball rolling and who says that she hopes that we can make scanned copies of the Obichaffs available to our members on our website in the future.

Raising Revenue: Submitted for Feedback

All, at the most recent Board meeting, we discussed a few options for

raising income.

One of them, increasing class prices, we will move forward with at a time determined by the Training Secretary to not cause difficulties with upcoming class registrations. We are basing this on a cost per hour for classes after researching what the going rate is regionally for obedience and agility classes. While our prices will still be somewhat lower, raising them will provide a significant bump in class income. This relieves my mind as we cut costs to afford this year's rent increase on the new lease, and I had been worrying over what we would do to afford the next two year's increases (the lease applies a 3% rent escalation every year).

Another option that we are not yet ready to ask for a decision on is to apply a co-pay for members taking classes. This does require membership approval according to our policies. The rationale is three-fold: tighten up class enrollment so that we know who is attending what classes (and therefore what classes have room!); discourage spotty attendance (which can take a spot away from another member in need of a class); and yes, create a bit more income. That last item truly is the least important in our thinking, although not negligible. Our real dilemma is not being able to provide enough classes for all of our members who need one. Our initial thought is \$50 per class, which for classes that don't have a defined start and end date, would be once per quarter.

Some CGCs at CDTC

Did you know Capital Dog Training Club offers quarterly Canine Good Citizen testing? Well, you do now!

Once per quarter, we are offering a Saturday drop-in testing session. Evaluators (Marnie McCown and myself) are prepared to evaluate for Canine Good Citizen (CGC) and Trick Dog titles.

Per the AKC, the CGC Program is a two-part program that is designed to teach responsible dog ownership to owners, and certify dogs that have the training and behaviors needed to be reliable, well behaved members of their families and communities.

To pass the test, dog and handler must complete all of the following:


1. Accepting a friendly stranger - evaluator approaches and pretends to shake hands with handler (hands 6-12" apart). Evaluator does not

touch dog.


- 2. Sitting politely for petting evaluator pets dog; dog must show no shyness or resentment.
- 3. Appearance and grooming evaluator inspects dog, combs or brushes lightly, examines ears and each front foot.
- 4. Out for a walk handler takes dog for a short walk including right turn, left turn, about turn and stop.
- 5. Walking through a crowd dog and handler walk close to several people; dog may show causal interest but not jump up.
- 6. Sit and down on cue/Staying in place handler shows that dog can do both sit and down, then chooses a position, leaves dog and goes to the end of a 20 ft. line, and returns immediately.
- 7. Coming when called with dog still on 20 ft. line from Test 6, handler walks out 10 ft. and calls the dog.
- 8. Reaction to another dog two handlers and dogs approach, pretend to shake hands (hands 6-12" apart), exchange pleasantries, then move on.
- 9. Reaction to distractions distractions are presented; dog may not panic or show aggression.
- 10. Supervised separation handler goes out of sight for 3-min. Dog is held on a 6-ft. leash by an evaluator.

The CGC title is a great goal for training teams to work towards.

On April's quarterly testing, we had three teams pass. Congratulations to Kate and Teddy, Jerusalem and Juice, and Julianne and Luna on their new CGC titles!

Let's talk trash. I mean real garbage!

As you know, in our lovely home county of Montgomery we have strict rules about recycling. This means that not just homes are required to recycle, but businesses as well. Our rules for recycling demand that we don't co-mingle paper with other types. Paper is separated from metal, glass and plastic. At our club house we have two containers for Recycling: one for paper, and one for metal, glass, and plastic. We also have Three (three) trash bins!

Here are the guide-lines for disposal:

Ordinary trash goes into one of the three regular trash bins. Paper towels in the lavatory, empty treat bags into one of the bins on the training floor, etc. Stuff that does NOT go into trash bins are food waste, dog waste, or anything else that might become rodent food. Please congratulate Molly when you see her. Having me as her dance partner is quite the cross to bear.




















Jennie Larkin writes:

Hawkeye showed in bred by exhibitor, puppy class, and sweeps. Hawkeye placed third in bred by puppy and second in her very competitive 9-12 month bitches class. Ranger also got class placements. Holly got to show off her kids in the Brood Bitch class. There were 12(!) brood bitches. The dam is not judged in this class except for obvious disqualifications. It is her kids that are judged. Hawkeye and Ranger were competing against other progeny who were already accomplished champions, so we didn't win anything, but we did have fun.

Our high point was Holly in Rally. She picked up her first 2 legs of Rally Excellent in the B class with respectable scores of 95 and 97. Then we got to play Team Rally. In Team, there are 4 handler-dog pairs who consecutively run the same Novice course. Timing begins when the first

pair leaves the Start sign and ends when the last pair passes Finish. It is a bit like a relay race. Holly and I were part of the "Golden Oldies" team, where either the dog, the handler, or both merited that moniker. Some of our team members had mobility issues, so we were a good 2 minutes slower than the next slowest team. However, we scored a perfect 400, the only one of the 9 teams to do so. The judge loved us and talked at length afterwards of the benefits of being correct vs. being fast.


