

Trial Chair: Mark Schneeberger


Hi! My name is Mark Schneeberger. I like dogs. So that's a plus. Also, I am a professional trainer of fifteen years. I graduated from the



Thanks to all for helping set up the rings, stewarding, lunch setup assistance and cleaning up.






















Trialing is an Addictive Sport!

You know, as a first time dog owner, competitive obedience and rally trialing can be dangerous to your health. It's true! I've come to realize, over the past 3 years of my membership with CDTC, Inc., that competing is ADDICTIVE. It's both painful and exhilarating, sometimes all in a single weekend. And I keep signing up for more. Sometimes you need your fellow addict/competitors to talk you off cliffs, to encourage you, to cajole you, and to massage your wounds. Inevitably I'm instructed to hand my phone to someone for filming (I hate that, Tom Tathem! And yet it always helps immeasurably). I'm a slightly over-competitive type person and get nervous easily (Gigi


Kamden finished his CD at CDTC's Trial. On to Open.

friendly.








Ken & Betsy Harringer write:



Delegate's Corner

In last month's issue I reported on the discussions in the CEC meeting only. Below will be my report on what occurred in the General Meeting of the Delegates.

- Dr. Thomas Davies, AKC Chairman of the Board, mentioned that litter registrations increased to its highest in 2021 and in 2022 due to pandemic. He stated today we are seeing encouraging growth in events and entries since 2021. Conformation Events are up almost 20% and entries have grown by approximately 9%. Performance Events have grown 11% and entries up 15%. Companion Events are up more than 10% and entries have grown by more than 11%. When we look at individual events, Rally increased by more than 16% and entries nearly 19%. Fast CAT continues to boom with more than 21% growth in events and nearly 30% growth in entries. Scent Work Events increased 17% and entries up 23%. He stated that these sports are excellent base from which to welcome newcomers to the world of AKC. He mentioned we have also seen an average of three new breeds per year, with four joining the AKC ranks since the waning pandemic.
- Mr. Sprung delivered the President's address and welcomed 31 new Delegates. He called on Ruth Crumb Delegate from Magic Valley KC to present our annual remembrance of 9/11. She has worked and assembling the stories from the Delegates who were present at the meeting on 9/11. She solicited stories from those who were present in 2001. There were 70 who remained as Delegates when she started this project and some of them have contributed stories. Ruth announced that a webpage on AKC.org has been created to house these living documents. She had those Delegates stand who were there in 2001.
- Mr. Sprung called on Kassi McCombe, AKC Business Intelligence Manager who discuss how she is transforming data and making it accessible and informative in AKC so internal stakeholders and employees can continue to strive towards a data driven workforce and data driven decision making ideal. She started five years ago.
- Mr. Sprung called on Caroline Murphy to share a short video called Meet the Breeds in the Field The purpose of the video is to demonstrate both form and function of working dogs.
- Ted Phillips, CFO, delivered the Financial Report which stated that litter registrations were up and 83% of them were done on line. On line dog registrations total 88% of dog registrations. He also stated the Sports and Events area looks very positive this year.

- Mr. Sprung called on Sheila Golfe in Government Relations, Dr. Carmen Battaglia, Delegate and Board member and Chris Sweetwood, AKC Board member and Delegate to give Delegates an update on the Detection Dog Task Force. A video was played on the Patriotic Puppy Program and its phases in puppy-raising fundamentals and protocols. It is felt that AKC breeders can raise exceptional detection dogs that meet our nation's needs. More than 140 breeders in 35 states are participating in the program. So far 70 Patriotic Puppy graduates are working on detection careers.
- An update was given by the AKC Juniors Committee. Sally Fineburg spoke on what her club has done with Juniors.
