
President: Shannon Hall



In addition to volunteering for the club, I volunteer for a few dog rescues, where I advocate for positive reinforcement training and other measures that are important in the rescue movement.




Training Secretary: Dianne Hardy

Dianne (Oshiro) grew up in Honolulu, Hawaii, obtained her A.B. in Biochemistry from the University of California at Berkeley, and her Ph.D. in Biology from the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. She and Matthew Hardy met in graduate school, married and moved to Baltimore, Maryland for postdoctoral fellowships in Reproductive Physiology at Johns Hopkins, then in 1990 to New York, NY to work as staff scientists at Population Council in New York, NY. Matthew died unexpectedly in 2007. In 2011, Dianne got a job at the National Institutes of Health as a Scientific Review Officer at the Center for Scientific Review and moved to Chevy Chase, Maryland. The work at the NIH was administrative. Using NIH databases and software, the SRO identifies and recruits experts in the scientific community to

review grant applications. Using information from the databases, SROs look for reviewers who meet requirements of current grant funding, expertise, geographical distribution, and diversity by gender, ethnicity and professional level. The SRO trains the reviewers, using video conferences, to use the proper criteria for review. SROs use matrix compilers and tools such as Microsoft Access Database Software to help organize review assignments and conflict of interest restrictions. The SRO manages timely submission by the reviewers, sets up the meetings, check reviewers' critiques for thoroughness and accuracy, and serves as the designated federal official at the meetings. After the meeting the SRO is responsible for assuring that the reviewers' scores for each application are accurately recorded, and prepares the written summaries of each review. While an SRO, Dianne also served on various committees and served as the Chair of the Scientific Review Officer Council for one year before retiring from the NIH in August 2024 after 13 years as SRO.

Dianne's obedience training competition experience goes back 35 years to her Chow Shepherd mix Sasha, who earned a CDX from AMBOR before the AKC allowed mixed breeds in obedience competition. Her current dogs are MACH PACH Rhyshek's Sierra Of Isabela RN MXS MJB MXP4 MXPB MJP4 MJPB PAX MFB MFPB T2B T2BP2 (Sierra, 12, yellow Labrador Retriever), MACH3 Rhyshek's Samba Pa Ti MXG MJG MFS TQX T2B2 (Santana, 6, black Labrador Retriever), and Periland Rye CD BN RN OA NAJ MXF CGC (Rye, 2, black and white Border Collie). Rye has also started training for sheep herding. Dianne has been a member of Capital Dog Training Club since December 2022 and has been an instructor of Beginning Handling in the Agility Program on Friday evenings since Fall 2023.




Obichaff Editor: Payton Murphy

When I'm not hanging with dogs, I'm working as a Real Estate Attorney now in the realm of renewable energy.



I started classes at CDTC in October of 2021 and became a member the following summer. I have served on the Board through 2 membership renewal seasons and have built a wonderful community among some of the members.



1. Confirm your dog is up to date on all necessary vaccinations. If your dog is small enough to travel via plane - this is a requirement. Carry a physical record of your dog's vaccination in case of emergency. Be aware of where the nearest emergency vet is during your stay.


- 2. Chat with your vet about travel medications. If your dog gets car sick or struggles to relax in new spaces, your vet can help by providing the best options for care.
- 3. If driving, get a car crate or crash-tested harness! Did you know a tiny 10-pound dog traveling in a car at 50mph can become a projectile with 500lbs of force in an accident? Keep yourself, your passengers, and your pup safe and contained. There are more options now than ever before, so head over to the <u>Center for Pet Safety</u>'s website to find their recommendations.
- 4. Make sure your pets all have updated ID tags! Double check the accuracy of phone numbers and ensure they are visible. If your pet is microchipped, take a look at the information attached to the chip now is a great time to update your address, contact info, and add an updated photo to their profile!
- 5. Brush up on your training! Well-behaved dogs are good guests. Bring your crate, work on your dog's impulse control, and know when to remove them from the party!

If you're lucky enough to have your friends and family close by, skip the travel stress and check out <u>these local dog-friendly holiday events</u> for some full-family friendly fun!



Mikey got his third MACH on October 5th. Good boy Mikey!








Shannon Hall also writes:

Delegate's Corner

In the Companion Events Committee meeting, we continue to discuss and show concern for Tripods in Obedience and Rally. As you know, the pilot program was extended until July 2, 2025 for Tripods in Obedience and Rally Non-Jumping Classes. This extension will

allow more judges to give input as they judge the three-legged dogs.

Recently, the committee held a private zoom meeting with some researchers investigating injuries to dogs in agility. So far, they have reported owners of 1,958 of the 4,701 dogs (41.7%) reported that their dog had experienced an injury severe enough to keep them from participating in agility for 1 week or more. 14% of dogs experienced a severe injury keeping them out of agility for 4 months or longer, or leading to retirement.

They presented to us the types of injuries and the % of dogs. I am listing the top six and if you are interested in the complete list, please email me requesting the entire list.

- Shoulder- 30.1%
- Iliopsoas-19.4%
- Digits-17.2%
- Lumbosacral- 17.2%
- Stifle-13.3%
- Thoracic spine- 13.2%

The most common shoulder injuries were Biceps Tendinopathy, Medial Shoulder syndrome/instability and Supraspinatus tendinopathy. The most common Iliopsoas injuries were Strain and Avulsion/Tear. The most common Digit injuries are Sprain/Strain injuries, Torn nails and Fractures. Finally, the most common Lumbosacral injuries were Intervertebral disc disease, lumbosacral instability and lumbosacral stenosis.

Currently, three-legged dogs are allowed to run agility. The committee continues to have safety concerns and has expressed the concern with the AKC Board. We feel the information above and what we have presented in the past from some veterinarian researchers support our concerns for these dogs in Obedience and Rally. We also feel AKC has safer events for these dogs to be participants, for example Scent Work and Tracking.

• has completed no less than three (3) months as a training member paying the prescribed fees/dues, and


