A research opportunity at Johns Hopkins University



Earlier in September, Hadley was lucky enough to participate in some studies for the Canine Minds Collective at Johns Hopkins University. The team there is studying canine cognition, intelligence, and behavior.

Per their description,

"Through our carefully designed studies, we can gather valuable data on a dog's problem-solving abilities, decision-making processes, memory, attention, and social behavior, while providing mental enrichment for our participants. A session at our lab will provide a positive enrichment and socialization opportunity for your dog (and treats!)."



We had so much fun during our hour long session and Hadley was exhausted for the rest of the day!

The study is accepting applicants on a rolling basis. Without providing any spoilers for the tasks, a very basic level of obedience and impulse control would be extremely helpful so there is some control during the tests, though it is not required.

They provide ultra-high quality single ingredient treats like beef liver and tripe! Hadley would like to participate every weekend, if allowed. They even wrapped up the session with some professional quality photos, seen above!

I mentioned training at Capital Dog Training Club while we were there and the whole team was eager to have some well-trained dogs participate.

Testing takes place on the University campus in Baltimore City; the process is extremely easy to partake in and they provide wonderful instruction.

The Ups and Downs of Trialing, an episodic story

I've been observing students and friends succeed, struggle, succeed and struggle again as they trial, as I've been experiencing the same cycle myself. We train until we think we are ready to trial; we trial only to find that we were not ready, or that the trial setting is so different than our class setting that it presents its own challenge; we initially do well only for our dog to wake up one day and decide that trials are either too scary or way too exciting and we fall apart as a team; or maybe the dream occurs and we progress steadily until our level of competition out-paces our training foundation and we need to do more work. Sometimes we expected it and trial on through.

I knew that my people-friendly Michael was going to get so excited seeing people in the agility ring that he'd NQ by running around to visit. I also knew that the only way to get past that phase was to go to trials and have it happen, while staying calm and positive and working through it in the moment. It took a few days of trialing to get to the point where we could run full courses without saying hi to the judge or ending up in the ring crew's lap, but we got there. We struggled for much longer with the occasional lapse of connection when he noticed his fan club watching him run or saw a favorite human auntie. No big deal, I'm delighted to have such a happy dog and it upped my connection game as I worked through it.

With Connor, my struggles when beginning to trial were much more fundamental. I truly had not yet figured out what pressure meant in agility terms, and was therefore clueless as to what my body position and motion was telling Connor to do, despite what I *thought* I was telling him to do. Over time with a lot of help from my instructors and experienced agility friends, I figured it out and started to play around with Connor's sensitivity to pressure in a helpful way. He's a great distance dog now that I understand him better.

In the first case I had to go through it to get through it. Trialing itself became the cure. In the latter, I had things to learn and fix before I was going to be successful in trials. Not that I let that stop me from spending my money on entry fees!

When do you want to keep trialing, and when might you benefit from a break to work skills or other things? Here are a few things to think about:

Is trialing allowing your dog to practice bad behavior? An example might be regularly launching contacts. It might be time to take a step back and reinforce contacts in class, entering only venues and classes where you can train in the ring and fix those contacts.

Are you re-training, training a new skill, or a practicing a new handling style? Perhaps pause on trialing until you and your instructor think you are ready.

Are you and your dog stressed? Are you frustrated and not having fun? Take a break! Come back slowly when you start to miss it.


I'm of the opinion that a bad day of agility is still a good day, and I love hanging out at agility trials with my dog friends, so taking a break is not appealing. In my case, I need to be diligent to not let start line stays lapse, to not completely ruin my dog's contact behavior (I've only sort of ruined it), and to take a deep breath from time to time when I mess up yet another QQ by running Michael the exact same way I ran Connor (or go mope in the car by myself until I get over it).

Hope to see you out at a trial soon!




Jennie Larkin writes:

Delegate's Corner

In the Companion Events Committee meeting:

In case you missed it. A CEC member opened our committee meeting with a quote from this September's AKC Gazette on Obedience as we know today: AKC Obedience has been a mainstay of our family of events since 1936. The people who are passionate about obedience are really passionate about obedience. A long-time obedience trainer tells us. So, why does an obedience competitor involve such passion in its devotees? For one thing it's a thinking person's game in which intense concentration and patience are as important as physical grace. Then there's the subtle beauty of it- a handsome dog performing Obedience Exercises smoothly and precisely can be mesmerizing. But more than anything, there's the joy of a handler and dog working together as one. Competing not necessarily to win

but to get the best out of themselves.

- We voted unanimously to send a written request to the AKC Board to approve displaceable jumps for the high jump in Obedience. Simply put, we feel it is a safety issue.
- Agility Nationals 2024- Dates March 14-17; Rally National and National Obedience- RNC July 18 and 19, NOC July 20 and 21
- For the month of July 381 dogs in the Rally Choice Class. Seven have earned the RC title as of July 28, 2023.
- Obedience Stewarding Video link was published in June.
- Gently talking to your dog in Obedience BN and Novice classes was discussed again because AKC staff said they have received feedback regarding participants friendly attitude existing in Companion Dog Sports obedience events (another registry). The CEC voted to not allow talking beyond what is allowed in BN and Novice A. The vote was unanimous. It was felt that there are other AKC events that allow conversation with the dogs. Also, Novice A is eligible for HIT and thus would not be fair for others in the other classes.
- Consistent Recording/Service fee per entry across all sports has been recommended by staff. All sports except conformation, obedience, rally and agility are already at \$3.50. The current fee for obedience was implemented in January 1, 2008. CEC voted unanimously to support this recommendation for a fee increase.
- A report was given on the status of clubs and the Junior Coordinator position in clubs.

In the next issue, I will report on the general meeting which included several presentations and updates for all clubs.


Active membership in the Capital Dog Training Club (CDTC) is available to an individual who:
