


## 5. Mix up times and routes for your daily walks.

Vary the time of day, place and route when you walk your dog, so that potential thieves loitering in the area don't become familiar with your routine. Some dogs are targeted and snatched during walks.

## 6. Don't overshare information about your pet.

Beware of strangers who start asking you too many questions about your dog or seem to be paying it a lot of attention. Be careful about what you post about your pets on social media - if you're uploading photos of them, make sure you're not giving away information that could disclose where you live.

## 7. Thoroughly research dog walkers, sitters, groomers and trainers.

Don't hand your dog over to just anyone. Always check references and reviews and ask for photo identification, before trusting your pet with someone new. Ask your friends or vet to recommend a professional they know and trust.

## 8. Neuter or Spay your pet.

Desexing your dog or cat will make them less desirable to thieves, who might be looking to breed them and make money from selling their puppies.

## 9. Keep your dog's ID up-to-date.

Make sure your pet is microchipped, and that you keep the details up-to-date, especially if you move house. Always make sure your pet is wearing a collar and ID tag with your name and mobile number on it and consider getting a GPS tracking device that can be attached to the collar and linked with an app on your phone.

## 10. Take lots of photos of your pet.

Take clear photographs of your pet from various angles and update them regularly. They'll come in handy if your dog is lost or stolen. Make a note of any features that might distinguish your dog from others of the same breed.

## If the worst should happen and your dog is stolen.

- Report it to the Police.
- Check "found pets" listings on rescue organizations and pounds.
- Make a flyer with a photo and details of your pet and post it in your neighborhood.
- Visit all your neighbors and talk to them directly about your missing pet. Ask them if they have any security footage from around the time your pet was stolen.
- Advise local vets, rescue organizations and shelters.
- Advise the microchip company so they can mark your dog's
record as "stolen".
- Spread the word on social media, it may help make your dog "too hot to handle". Post details and photos of your dog on social media and ask people to share your post.


Fun Autumn Hikes and Activities You Can Do with Your Dog


Payton Murphy writes: "Not sure if this is too far, but it's a GREAT hike for people looking for a bit of a challenge and it is super beautiful in the fall. Two hours outside the city in Shenandoah, there's an 8.5 mile trail called Hightop Peak Loop. It can be shortened to about 5.5 miles as well. The views on top of Hightop Peak are amazing! There are lots of cute BnBs in the area if anyone wants to make a weekend of it. Here's Hadley showing off the view; this is September so leaves hadn't changed much yet."

Shenandoah National Park is a dog friendly wonderland. Dogs are allowed on most hiking trails, in the campgrounds and pet friendly lodging is available. Be sure that you and your dog are physically up for the hike and that you can control your dog if it
encounters a wild animal. Have a plan if your dog is injured on a hike. Always check the park's web page for specific rules concerning dogs.

Tiffin Shewmake writes: "One of my favorite dog walks is the Muddy Branch Trail. The 9 mile trail runs from
 Darnstown Road in Gaithersburg (where there is parking) to Blockhouse Point on River Road and the C\&O Canal at Pennyfield Lock. I usually park at Darnstown Road. From that parking area, there is an upper trail that runs through the woods and has more hills and a lower trail that runs along Muddy Branch. We mostly let the dogs off lead to swim and get the zoomies and then leash them up for walking because there are walkers, dogs, bikes and the occasional horse from the Potomac Horse Center on the trail. However, it's not that crowded."

The C\&O Canal is a dog-friendly national park. The towpath runs from Georgetown for 184 miles to Cumberland. I live near the Carderock entrance to the park. While it has bathroom facilities and ample parking, in the warm weather it tends to be crowded, especially with bicyclists. I am always worried that someone in a hurry to get to no place in particular will injure my dog. There are hiking trails that I can access, and I use those, without fear of people on bicycles.

Magic's happy place is the Izaak Walton League in Poolesville. The IWL is a 624 -acre conservation farm. Dogs are welcome and can run off leash. You must be a member to enter the property, so there are very few people and the chances of running into another hiker are
low. There are no special requirements for becoming a member, but there is a yearly work commitment.

Not far from the IWL is the McKee-Beshers Wildlife Management Area. Located next to the Potomac River and the C\&O Canal, the McKee-Beshers Wildlife Management Area is over 1,971acres of fields and forests you and your dog can explore. The best place to enter is off of Hughes Road. As you enter, there is parking on your right. There are two large ponds that are frequented by bird watchers and photographers. This is a great place to explore, but you should keep you dog on leash. Once you are past the ponds, you can walk the fields in either direction with little chance meeting another person. Once cautionary note, horseback riding is permitted on the property, so your dog may find some nice horse poop to roll in. Trust me, it is a long ride home.

There are several great farm and pumpkin patches in the area that are dog friendly! A quick note - sometimes policies change at the last minute or even during the season so be sure to double check the farm's website before heading out with your pup to confirm dogs are still allowed and whether tickets are required.

Hollins Farms is a fantastic local farm to check out in the fall. The farm always has a wide variety of pumpkins and gourds for purchase. But also offers sprawling mountain views of autumn leaves and apple orchards you can walk through. Friendly dogs are always welcome on a leash including in the pumpkin patches and apple orchards (just not in the vegetable gardens). Best part - no tickets required / no admission fee so this farm is perfect for a last minute visit.

Editors Note: Barrel Oak Winery (BOW) is also located in Delaplane. BOW is dog friendly, has food and, of course, wine.

and activities for the kids and your pup can accompany you everywhere - in the pumpkin patch, on the hayride, in the corn maze, and touring around the farm to see the animals (the turkeys are always a big hit with Tenley). Advance tickets have been required since the COVID 19 pandemic began so be sure to check the website before heading to this farm and if you plan to go on a weekend in October, purchase your tickets early as they do sell out quick.


Sneads Farm

Sneads Farm is another great local farm where you can take your pup to explore and pick out a pumpkin. There is an activity area for kids at the back of the farm and farm animals to sniff including horses and sheep. For those planning ahead, Sneads Farm is also a pick your own Christmas tree farm in November/December and you and your pup can stroll along the rows of trees until you find the perfect one. There is a nominal per person fee that you pay upon entering the farm - no advance tickets required.

This dog friendly farm offers a corn maze and apple picking in September and then a
large pumpkin patch and fall festival in October. Tickets tend to sell out for the weekends so its best to purchase early.

Burnside Farms

Burnside Farms is a great dog friendly spot - at this farm you can walk through several sunflower fields in the late summer/ early fall. I was just there in mid-August and there were still tons and tons of sunflowers that had yet to bloom. Currently the sunflower festival is set to run through Labor Day, but I expect it will be extended to midSeptember due to the current state of the sunflower fields. Advance tickets are required so check the farm's website.

## Delegate's Corner

The next Delegates meeting will be in September; however, the AKC Board of Directors passed the following at its August meeting which could affect our club:

The Disqualification and Reinstatement procedure was modified to establish that dogs disqualified more than once under the provisions of Chapter 11 Section 8-A of the Rules Applying to Dog Shows are ineligible for reinstatement. This applies to
disqualifications by judge for attacking a person in the ring, by Event Committee for Attacking and injuring a person or a dog, or administratively barred due to multiple excusals for aggression.

Board Policy was modified to require only one judge for three passes for lower level titles in Obedience, Agility, and Rally. This was a provision placed in effect during COVID and is being made permanent.

Board Policy was modified to remove the restriction on the number of times an individual can judge a class at Obedience or Rally trials in a cluster. This was a provision put in place during COVID and is being made permanent.

Board Policy was modified to reduce the date and mileage restriction for judging assignments in Agility to 30 days/100 miles. This was a modification to a provision that was put in place during COVID and is effective January 2, 2023.

As a reminder, the AKC Board wanted to remind clubs the AKC rules and regulations require that at least (5) members of the Event committee must be individually listed in the premium list. All members of the Event Committee must be from the event giving club and they must be in good standing with both the club and the AKC. Our Trial Secretary should take note.

Also, the Board did not discuss or make a decision on the tripod in Obedience at its August meeting. It is on the agenda of my CEC meeting in September and thus we will inquire where this issue stands.
