# A Review: Puppy Culfure– fhe Powerful First 12 Weeks Thaf Can Shape Your Puppy's Fufure

In This Issue recently watched this wonderful video by Jane Killion, who is a professional dog trainer and a breeder of Bull terriers. It's all about raising puppies. The video consists of four discs—three that follow the puppies week to week, and the forth is a re-cap of the series.

The video follows the author's litter of eight Bull terrier puppies from birth through sending them home with their new owners. The movie alternates between interview scenes with the author and shots of the puppies in day-to-day from life. There are interviews with other experts, such as vet-

erinarians, who have specialized knowledge in areas of interest such as fear imprinting, immunization, and neurological development in young puppies.

The level of detail in the information is very thorough and is presented in manner that flows naturally as the puppies develop from week-to-week. It is clearly laid out with lots of examples and live footage showing the differences in the main characters—the puppies—and how to handle situations as they develop. Subjects addressed include: when to introduce new people; when to introduce new dogs; how to begin house-training; when and how to begin crate-training; how to avoid resource guarding issues; how to develop problems solving and how to encourage self-reliance and boldness.



The material is pretty dense and lots of information is handed to the

Renway is now a senior citizen—well, technically. At ten years old, he is slowing down a bit. Instead of fifty ball tosses across the field, I limit it to twenty, with a break for a walk and then he gets another five. At ten years young, he still wants more because he craves it and catching a ball makes him deliriously happy. It was our first style of play when Fen was a young puppy and I truly think that he is now hard-wired to be an OTCH-MACH-Master of Ball Catching. It's just what he needs to do.

As Fen grew up, I thought he had more potential than running after a ball. And, to be honest, I wanted more than a "pet" dog. Serious training became my passion and Fen seemed to enjoy it, too, although he is rarely serious! Thankfully, I discovered CDTC and we enrolled in obedience, rally and agility classes. Instructors encouraged us to consider competing and taught us the necessary skills so that we could do reasonably well under a judge's scrutiny. We learned how to methodically train and went to many classes, training groups and seminars at CDTC. I got the tools to give Fenway a wonderful foundation for success. I *thought* I was doing right by my dog by giving him every opportunity to realize his potential.

But somehow, along the way, I forgot about the value of play—simple, joyful play with no goal other than happiness. We played ball just a little bit. Instead, Fen's exercise was agility jump grids, difficult weave pole entrances, endless heeling and signal exercise proofing. A walk or frisbee/ ball session always included a minute or two of obedience training. Even admitting this makes me cringe!

Ever affable Fenway dutifully put up with my "Tiger Mom" routine but I noticed problems developing when it came time to trial. Fen (and I!) started developing ring nerves. Some big soul searching was in order and I realized that I wasn't having fun and neither was poor Fen.

Now a new routine is in order: ball play, tug, hikes and just a little bit of training—but not at the expense of play. Fen is relaxed and happy again. I have my joyful boy back and no amount of titles or Q's is worth giving up his lovely smile or hearing happy barks. That's success!

### **Delegates** Corner

- Doug and Pam gave a report on the statistics for the companion events. Unfortunately, all entries including agility and rally were low.
- Pam presented the numbers on the participants in the Orlando events. All companion events and demos were presented. Juniors participated in Obedience and Agility and had their own classes. This event has become an extravaganza with all aspects of the Dog World represented including Nosework and Barn Hunt. It will again be held in Orlando in December 2018
- I presented my sub-committee's first report on "Finding Solutions to Encourage All-Breed Clubs to Have Obedience/Rally Trials". A survey was done of the clubs with a very good response from the Delegate All Breed Clubs. Some of their main concerns/reasons for dropping the events were: cost of Judges, number of Stewards needed and cost, lack of space in indoor facilities where conformation events are being held, and declining entries in Obedience. The sub-committee is still working on suggestions to encourage these clubs to think about holding obedience trials and rally events. Upon completion of a list of suggestions, I will present and distribute the list to the All-Breed Delegate committee. Currently on our list of suggestions, we have working with Obedience clubs and having them give the help they need to hold give trials and get stewards. I, in the past, and Benita, currently, is doing this with National Capital KC and the entries have continued to increase at the October show. Also on the list was training 4H and Boy Scouts to be steward by offering How-To Seminars and effectively scheduling Judges to decrease cost.

# **Call For Nominations!** CDTC 2018 Outstanding Sportsmanship Award

ive years ago the AKC started giving all affiliated clubs the opportunity to present annually to a member an award of "outstanding sportsmanship". The following are criteria for which this award recipient at CDTC will be chosen:

**1.** The recipient will be an Active Member in good standing for at least five years. The recipient will have contributed time and effort in support of club activities, for example classes, matches and trials.

**2.** The recipient shall have made a difference to the sport of performance dogs, for instance encouraging

newcomers, promoting participation in club activities among members and furthering the knowledge and practice of dog training.

**3.** The recipient will have shown examples of sportsmanship in the following ways:

• Refusing to compromise his/her commitment to the sport of performance dogs or the reputation of the club by injecting personal advantage or consideration into his/her decisions or behavior.

• Spurning any opportunity to take personal advantage of positions offered or bestowed.

• Making always his/her chief responsibility the welfare of his or her dogs.

• Refusing to embarrass the sport, himself/herself, or CDTC while taking part in activities.

#### **The Selection Process**

**1.** Nominations from the membership will take the form of written supporting informative statements of 500 words or less, sent by mail or email to the AKC Delegate, Joyce Dandridge, no later than April 15, 2018.

**2.** The nominations and supporting information will be published in the June *Obichaff* so members may vote.

**3.** Members will vote by written ballot at the general meeting in June. The CDTC President will select tellers to count the votes and the membership's choice will be announced at the meeting.

**4.** The presentation of the AKC medallion will take place at the Annual Awards Dinner in July.

**5.** Nominees must approve of their nomination. If you are nominating someone, please check with them to see if they qualify and will accept the award.

# WANTED Mentee/Assistant for Run thrus!

I am looking for someone who is interested in learning how the run thru's run, with the eventual aim of taking over! It's fun and it's simple.

It can be more than one person: someone must be the Match Chairperson and *MUST* be on site for the entire run thru each month—but it doesn't need to be the SAME person, each month.

Run thru's are held the first weekend of the month, January, February, March, June, July & September. *CUR-RENTLY*, we hold January and September on Saturday, and all the others on Sunday. We implemented this plan to allow more/different people to attend and to help out.

Duties include filling out a VERY simple form for each month, and sending it to AKC (and waiting for approval). In addition, we need the event publicized—we currently use *Match-Show Bulletin*, our CDTC website & FaceBook, signs in the clubhouse, & *Obichaff.* Pre-entries start coming in a little before the day of the match and they need to be entered into the run order form, which I do the night before the match. Also, change for cash entries needs to be gotten. We often provide coffee & donuts—I usually have someone else attending get those for me.The Chair also need to make sure there are plenty of volunteers to help: judges (for 4 classes) stewards and often a table helper. Generally, we need a minimum of nine people. However, the more—the better!

On the day of each match, I usually arrive about 30 minutes before the doors open to set up: 2 big rings. One is regulation size for Utility and the other small ring for Stays & practice. I put out folding hairs, a table for entries near our lobby area, make sure bathroom is presentable and get the forms ready for walk-in entries Then, I usually take the walk-in entries but this can be done by a volunteer. All the chair REALLY has to do is be there to be in charge!

My personal rule, which I have forced the run thru's to adhere to, is that everyone gets their first run before anyone gets a second run, and everyone must be happy with US (CDTC)! I can't help if they're happy with their dog, but I can make sure that things run smoothly.

There are MANY club members who help, and it's not an onerous task, but I could use help/backup and a dependable volunteer member to train to take over. and I'd like to be able to "retire" at some point (probably whenever I get a puppy—which likely won't be any time really soon.)!

So why don't you consider becoming my assistant! This is a fun way to get involved and meet members.

Please email me if you're interested... we can try things out, nothing needs to be set in stone!

viewer, but it is handled with intelligence. I also appreciated that in the interview scenes, presenter Jane Killion avoids any verbal ticks and repetitions. She utters no fillers such as "You know....""I mean" ...and there is no dead air, either. All of the footage of the puppies is very well done. It is a real pleasure to watch the babies as they grown up. All in all the production values are first rate. The camera work is seamless and well-lit and on a level where we can really see the subjects.

I highly recommend this video! Anybody who is teaching a training class would benefit from the information included in it. I usually find instructional videos to be a chore, but this one is the exception. It's very entertaining and easy to watch. Furthermore, I agreed with all the training advice! My only caveat is that the training methods shown are limited to positive reinforcement and trial and error learning because it follows the puppies up



to 10 weeks or so. As far as that goes, it's very good.

For anybody raising a litter of puppies, this should be required watching. It's a veritable "Puppy Head Start." Unfortunately, most of the dogs/pups we see at CDTC in our classes lack this early learning experience. However, I believe that armed with this further knowledge of early puppyhood, any instructor would be better equipped to help their students.
