

**... to the editor**

*In response to the Training Director's article in the October issue about electronic collars:*

The electronic collar, properly used, is the most humane way to train a dog. I use one daily. I have field trial Labradors, and they understand my use of the collar. My dogs are happy to work, are not traumatized by the collar, and understand every correction. Every training aid can be used improperly and cause confusion and pain to a dog – even the “plain buckle collar”.

For distance the collar is without an equal. For frail people with rambunctious dogs, it is without an equal. There is no better method to ensure instant response to a command, and this is often a safety issue in our environment of cars and trucks.

I remember when Capital did not allow pinch collars; they were considered brutal. Perhaps it is time to rethink Capital's e-collar policy.

## Why I Teach Basic Classes

I have two main motivators to teach Basic obedience. One is primary, and that is my love of dogs and desire to keep them in their homes. Basic obedience helps with this in numerous ways. It builds the relationship between dog and human. It (one hopes!) leads to a better-behaved dog and provides the human with the tools to properly manage the dog and to continue to train at home. There are the direct and potentially life-saving benefits of course, like a reliable recall, a dog that will remain in the house or backyard despite an open door or gate, and advice on good collars and leashes so that Fido stays safe and controllable, making dog walking more pleasant and therefore more likely to occur. And let us not forget the annoyance factor, like jumping and barking. Help the student fix these annoyance issues and their appreciation of their dog goes up as their exasperation goes down.

It's not only the direct training advice either. Often helping the human to have a greater understanding of the dog can by itself be a huge benefit. When people see that their dog's previously inexplicable behavior is not only understandable but normal, it quite often fixes the real problem, which isn't necessarily the behavior but the human's reaction to it. When a previously lovely puppy goes through a second fear period, or just "teenage" lunacy, if the human doesn't understand this, it can lead to the dog losing their home and sadly, perhaps their life. If an instructor explains normal dog development and gives them some tools to manage through the stage, that relationship can be saved. I've also been able to provide advice and guidance on dog

health, from tooth brushing and nail trimming to how to decide when a dog needs to see the vet. Have a student complaining about her bitch's sudden house-breaking issues and you too will be able to "diagnose" a UTI! Perhaps the most direct influence I ever had on keeping a dog alive and in his home happened last year in one of my classes, when I was able to provide perspective on the cost of daily medicine to a couple who were still reeling from their dog's unusual diagnosis. Once cast in the light of how much they'd be willing to spend on coffee drinks for themselves per day, they were immediately reassured that it was reasonable to spend that much to save the dog they loved. He is a happy and spoiled dog today, healthy with that one daily pill.

I said I have two main motivators. The other is simply that I can, as a trainer, learn far more from exposure to many dogs of different breeds, ages and temperaments than I can from only the dogs I have myself. It is so interesting to figure out solutions to other people's problems. I might never have had difficulty training a down before, but I've had to develop some thoughts on dogs that don't lie down. I have certainly never had a leadership problem with a dog, but I can diagnose and fix them in other teams. I've played with many more types of equipment than I ever would have on my own and learned a lot about breeds I don't ever plan to have, but can now admire others for having the patience to train. To those with hounds and terriers, I salute you!

And especially to Jane, who continues to do everything that she can for our club, in any way that she can.

I find that thanking people can be a problem, because I somehow end up leaving out someone's name. If I have done so, please forgive me. I didn't mean to.

Our trial is different in several ways. Joyce prepares very nice welcome bags for each Novice A, and Beginners Novice A entries. Our club does a pot luck lunch for our judges and our volunteers. We offer that lunch to exhibitors, for five dollars. I've not been to any other trial, not agility, rally, nor obedience, that has such a wonderful club offered opportunity.

We offered all of the fun classes, the "non-regular" classes. Hopefully you had the chance to stay and watch our obedience team do their things. That was many weeks of preparation and practice.

Capital faces some unusual situations. For now, our rally trial must be held: the day of, the day before, or the day after ... our obedience trial. We hold ours the day before. That is the day that Mount Vernon holds their obedience trial (they hold their rally trial on Friday). I was able to get us special permission to start our trial as soon as one of the Mount Vernon obedience rings is available. So we need to have our club members there for Saturday afternoon, at a time that is flexible (but not before three o'clock), and then again all day Sunday.

Mount Vernon has one of the three judges judge their rally trial on Friday. We can't. They are typically at their eight-hour limit of judging for the obedience trial that same day. So we have to hire another judge, for rally. We try to use local judges for that, to keep travel and hotel expenses down. There are only so many local judges. Another issue to work out each year.

The A.K.C., the facility, the porta-potties, keeping the porta-potties "stocked", emptying the trash cans, dealing with the dog waste, cleaning up and getting the building ready for inspection so we can get our deposit back, it is all a never ending series of events.

From getting people together months in advance, to working with our absolutely wonderful and incredible professional show secretary service (Rhonda), to putting together the premium list, to holding our breath and waiting for the entries to come in, to putting together the judging program, to the show catalog. To taking the judges to dinner (thank you Melitta), to their hotel (thank you Bob), to their airport (thank you Mary). To getting the vendor and the photographer there, and making sure that they are not in the way.

To making sure that we have our insurance coverage (thank you Donna), and having some way to play the National Anthem. (This year my disc player didn't work, so Ken sang instead. When he hesitated on a word or two, everyone there joined in and sung with him.) To when the porta-potties didn't show up, and that became a major issue.

To making sure that we have "No Parking" spaces for us, to fresh batteries for the stop watches. To easels for each ring, to water for the judges. To what prize goes to the "High Scoring Dog With a Tracking Title", or whatever, to the incredible tomato soup that Benita makes every year. To every thing that every single club member that came out and helped with, thank you. WE DID GOOD!!!

The A.K.C. event schedule follows the weekends of the year, except when the first weekend includes New Years. That is why the Turkey Cluster might not be on Thanksgiving. For this year, that calendar and the Jewish holidays had our events on Yom Kippur. So we had conflicts there. Shellie and I were running back and forth between our trials and our temple. When

we took the judges to dinner Saturday, we broke our day long fast there. It was all very interesting.

Attendance is down at obedience trials everywhere, as was ours, but we still had a huge turn out. Out of eight hours maximum, one of our judges had 7:43. Our rally entry was up over last year. We brought in a new rally judge, from Richmond. For the first time, I believe EVER, our trial income actually was greater than our trial expenses. When we add in our Trophy Fund and our Trial Fund contributions, we had a very nice net income.




Lucy earned her RN in April and her RA on October 8, 2011.
