Delegates Corner

First, I would like to thank the membership for awarding me the 2015 CDTC AKC Outstanding Sportsmanship Award at the annual awards dinner. As mentioned at the dinner, I have trained at the club for over 25 years and have always found instructors/members to be friendly and helpful to me and my dogs. For a long time, I could only train my dogs with little involvement due to a 24/7 work schedule. However, I always said, that when I could, I would give back to the club that supported me and my dogs and allowed us to accomplish titles in obedience and conformation for so many years. As an instructor and Delegate for the club, I have tried to do that.

■ As you may have heard, China is trying to modify history of particular breeds of pure-bred dogs by removing “Tibetan” in some

breed names. I have been informed that at the last AKC Board meeting, AKC wanted clubs to know they will make no changes to breed historical references in its records unless there is a formal, documented and substantiated request made by the applicable AKC Parent Club.

■ I received a notice from the AKC Pet Disaster Relief Task Force stating that 24 trailers have rolled out across the country. There are also 11 more in the pipeline ready to roll and 16 others that are actively fundraising. It was great to see some members come to Howard County Fairgrounds on July 5 to see the trailer our club sponsored.

■ I have been notified by AKC Events Operations Department that our event representative is Elizabeth Fogleman. She will be in charge of process and approval of all club event applications and judges panels.

■ Finally, I received notification from the AKC in reference to the Board’s position to Yulin Dog Meat Festival held in China which has created outcries around the world. As you know, FCI has designated the World Dog Show to be in China in 2019. AKC believes these protests are completely justified and imperative for there to be any chance of eliminating institutionalized and heinous treatment, torture and consumption of thousands of dogs each year. AKC urges China to implement educational programs to help end the barbarous practice of torture and eating of dogs. AKC offers assistance in this effort in any way possible.


I also jumped off the side of the pool and the game was to see who could jump the farthest; I am no competition for the big dogs. After dinner, we went for a walk with our new friends.

We put on demonstrations of obedience, rally, and agility. We have dogs at every level, and dogs that just “work the crowd”, as good ambassadors. Whatever you can and want to do is appreciated!

As with any sport, dog performance sports done absolutely perfectly,

looks easy. We know that it is far from easy. To the very large crowd of spectators, they like the “miscues” perhaps more than the flawless performances. So don’t worry that your dog is still training—we are a training club).

We need folks to assemble equipment to be taken out there, unload and set up, assist with the performances, take down and haul away. And of course we need lots of teams from our training programs—obedience, rally and agility and everything in between—to put on the performances and work the crowds.

It is typically hot and humid. You will be working on sawdust that is probably full of animal poop and urine—it is the county fair—with a zillion folks all around and lots and lots of noises. But it is also the most satisfying thing that you might do with your dog—knowing that you are presenting what we do at CDTC to the largest audience you might encounter. It is an incredible feeling to show the broader community what dogs (and even their own pets) can do!

“Many, many years ago, I was at the fair and saw this demonstration. I was so impressed that dogs could do that, especially in that type of environment, under those conditions, that I wanted to try to train that in my own dog, and here I am today,” says Burton Goldstein.
